

J. C. S. MORROW OF GEORGETOWN DIES

HIS WIFE WAS THE DAUGHTER OF GENERAL SAM HOUSTON.

FORT WORTH, Texas, March 6.—Captain J. C. S. Morrow, 85 years old, of Georgetown, died at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon in a local sanitarium. The body will be accompanied Saturday morning to Georgetown, where funeral services will be held probably Sunday, by his son, Temple H. Morrow of Dallas. San Gabriel Masonic Lodge No. 89 of Georgetown, of which Mr. Morrow was one of the first members, will be in charge of funeral services.

Captain Morrow's wife, formerly Miss Nannie Elizabeth Houston, eldest daughter of Sam Houston, first President of the Republic of Texas, died about four years ago.

Born at Versailles, Woodford County, Kentucky, Nov. 20, 1839, Captain Morrow came to Austin, Texas, shortly before the outbreak of the Civil War, moving to Georgetown a year later. At the outbreak of the Civil War he became Captain of Company I, Twelfth Texas Cavalry, Parson's Brigade, which was formed of Williamson County men. He served throughout the war in that capacity, being engaged in what is known as the Red River campaign. He was made a Master Mason in a military lodge on the banks of Red River during the campaign.

Returning from the war, he engaged in the general mercantile business in Georgetown and later in Round Rock. During the Wilson administration he served four years as postmaster at Quanah. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving him, besides his son, are three daughters, Mrs. Robert A. John and Mrs. Jennie M. Decker, of Houston, and Mrs. G. H. Loc of Toledo, Ohio.
