

Death Claims William King

Father of Dallas News- paper Man Dies in Fort Worth.

FORT WORTH, Texas, March 22.—William H. King, 73, retired cattleman and a resident of Fort Worth for over twenty-five years, died at his home, 1610 Harrington avenue, early Thursday, following a long illness.

Mr. King for many years had the DB and DTL ranches near Abilene before coming to Fort Worth and prior to that time was in the banking and cattle business at Greenville.

He was the son of the late Judge Oswin H. King, the first County Judge of Hunt County. He was a brother of the late Tom King of Greenville and Ed King of Pittsburg.

Surviving are his wife, whom he married fifty-one years ago; three daughters, Mrs. James Burgess, Mrs. Roy J. Vanham and Mrs. George R. Kelley, all of Fort Worth; four sons, C. R. King of St. Louis, W. O. King of Rush Springs, Ok.; J. Wylie King of San Antonio and Oswin K. King, Dallas newspaper man, and three sisters, Mrs. Lou Sorelle of Houston and Mrs. Margaret Wright and Mrs. Elizabeth Patterson, the latter two of McAlester, Ok.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the North Fort Worth Undertaking Company chapel.
