

Aerial Attack Gives Frogs 14-0 Victory Over Baylor; Blackie Williams Is Star

WACO, Texas, Oct. 29.—Playing a rather listless football game, in which fumbles were frequent and no passes outstanding, the Texas Christian University Horned Frog team Saturday defeated the Baylor Bears by a score of 14 to 0.

The splendid work that was displayed by the Christians a week ago against the Texas Aggies was being missed Saturday afternoon in the fighting play of the Baylor team in their game against Central a week ago also was conspicuous for its absence. Time after time Brain backs fumbled the ball and after time T. C. U. players missed passes thrown into their arms. It was truly a game of fumbles and misplays.

Matthews Drops 'Em.

Ray Matthews, while he still had a great game at the left half position, failed to come close to the brilliant and starry work he had against the Aggies and the Aggies. He tossed many a pass back for losses, but he dropped three passes that were thrown into his waiting arms.

Ray Clark started the game for the Christians at quarter in place of Capt. Blackie Williams, who was injured, and while Clark gained a little ground for the visitors, he did not have his share of the yardage. Toler, 169-pound halfback, was the star of the starting T. C. U. team, doing most of the passing and all of the punting. His kicking, running at times was his best, however.

Williams Is Star.

When one picks the outstanding stars of the ball game, let it be said that there were two. One was Gene Williams on the Bear team, the other a member of the Christian eleven. Capt. Blackie Williams was rushed into the game by Coach Matty Bell. Now, if there was a man sent into a ball game who delivered the goods, Blackie Williams is that man.

It was in the latter part of the first quarter, with some three minutes left to play. The Frogs had the ball on Baylor's 28-yard line and the count was locked at 7 to 0. Williams substituted for Ray Clark, the field general. On the very first play, Williams made a perfect 15-yard pass to Toler and the Christian back made a fast run for the remaining yards and put over the counter. Matthews kicked goal and the Toads were ahead by a count of 7 to 0.

Mr. Bell immediately took Mr. Williams out of the game, for Mr. Williams had done just about as much for one day. Sitting on the bench during the entire game, with the exception of the few minutes he took off to score a touchdown for his team, Capt. Blackie Williams may well be called the outstanding star of the game.

Griffin Examined.

But there was one other player who was a star along with Williams. It was Gale Griffin, Baylor left end. Griffin was a defensive star from the very start of the game. He continuously smeared T. C. U. players for losses and when there was an inch gained at the end, Always Griffin dumped in for interference (and if it was made it was the fault of the players who were backing up on him). Griffin was a star of

stars Saturday and Matthews could have taken a few pointers from him.

A break went against the Bears early in the first quarter, when Pruitt fumbled on his own 26-yard line and Morgan recovered for the Frogs. Griffin threw Toler for a 5-yard loss and then Toler passed 15 yards to Matthews. They were checked on the 18-yard line and Matthews attempted a place-kick, but missed. Charlie Noble, punting with the wind, booted a long one over Toler's head for 78 yards, leaving the ball on the T. C. U. 2-yard line.

Bears Are Held.

Baylor on the exchange of punts got the ball on T. C. U.'s 28-yard line and carried it to the 16-yard line, where they were held for downs, failing to make the grade by inches. That was the only real chance the Bruins had to score throughout the entire game.

The contest continued with frequent fumbles and listless playing by both sides and the half was near a close when Blackie Williams was rushed in with orders to pass and pass again. On the first attempt, he heaved 15 yards to Toler, who went across for the first score. Matthews converted, and the Frogs were leading, 7 to 0, at the end of the first half.

Early in the third quarter, Newberry fumbled on his own 29-yard line and Clark recovered to chase over for the second and final score of the game.

Penalties—Baylor 34 yards, T. C. U. 16 yards. Touchdowns—Toler, Clark. Matthews kicked two goals after touchdowns.
