ARTICLE XI, SECTION 3.

AMENDED QUALIFICATIONS FOR MEMBERSHIP, ADOPTED MARCH 30, 1895.

All women shall be eligible to membership in this Association who may be either widow, mother, daughter, sister or lineal descendant of such men as served in the Confederate Army, Nav Civil Service, or of those persons who, residing in the South during the war, gave aid to the cause.

Also applications for membership to the Association shall be in writing, in such form as may be scribed by the Association. They shall be submitted at one meeting, and referred to the Committe Applications, and acted upon at a subsequent meeting on the report of such committee. It will req the three-fourths vote of all members at any meeting to admit any applicant to membership.
